The Songs of the Thankful Heart

Many of the hymns we sing at Thanksgiving sound bright and triumphant — full of joy, harmony, and celebration. Yet behind many of those cheerful melodies are stories not of comfort, but of hardship. The most enduring songs of gratitude were often written by people who knew suffering firsthand and still chose to give thanks.

Consider “Now Thank We All Our God.” It’s often sung as a hearty anthem of praise, but its author, Martin Rinkart, wrote it during unimaginable loss. Rinkart was a Lutheran pastor in Eilenburg, Germany, during the Thirty Years’ War — a time of brutal conflict, famine, and disease. When plague struck his city, he found himself as the only surviving pastor, performing as many as fifty funerals a day, including that of his own wife. His home became a shelter for the sick and starving. And yet, surrounded by suffering, he penned a hymn that speaks of “countless gifts of love” and a God who “still is ours today.”

Those words weren’t written from a place of comfort; they were a declaration of faith — a choice to believe that gratitude and sorrow can coexist, that thanksgiving can rise from ashes.

More than two centuries later, Folliott Pierpoint, a young English poet, looked out across the hills near Bath and wrote the poem “For the Beauty of the Earth.” His life wasn’t marked by war or loss, but by quiet reflection. He saw God’s goodness in the simple, everyday wonders — the sky, the flowers, the love between friends and family. His words remind us that gratitude doesn’t always shout; sometimes it simply notices.

And then there’s “Give Thanks with a Grateful Heart,” written in the 1970s by Henry Smith, a man facing both professional disappointment and the slow loss of his vision. Newly graduated from seminary, Smith couldn’t find a church position. As his sight faded, he clung to the words “And now, let the weak say, “I am strong,” Let the poor say, “I am rich,” because of what the Lord has done for us. Give thanks.” Out of that quiet struggle came a song sung now around the world — a simple chorus of steady, trusting gratitude.

Each of these hymns tells the same truth in its own way: thankfulness is not a reaction to an easy life. It’s a discipline, a way of seeing. Gratitude is what faith sounds like when life is uncertain — the echo of hope that refuses to be silenced.

So as the Thanksgiving season approaches and we lift our voices in these songs — whether centuries old or freshly written — we join a long line of believers who have done the same. People who looked hardship in the eye and still sang, “Now thank we all our God.”

God does not call us to isolate ourselves. He calls us to gather, serve, and to learn together. He even called the animals to walk together to get on the Ark. God wants you to experience the good of being connected to a church family. We want that for you also! We are ready to build that together relationship with you when you are ready for it!

Join a Sunday School Class, small group, or volunteer in a ministry. Enjoy the holidays. You are not alone!

MISSION TRIPS

Our NC Baptist on Mission (NCBOM) Dental Clinic was a great success for our community. Our goal was to share Jesus with all patients and families that attended and to provide free, high-quality dental care to community members in need. We had 11 dental professional volunteers, 25 support staff volunteers and 3 volunteers from NCBOM.

- 46 patients received dental screenings and cleaning
- 33 patients received procedures on the Dental Bus, which included:
 - 11 fillings patients
 - 12 extraction patients
 - 10 complete exams with x-rays and other procedures

The positive feedback from patients was a testament to the dedication of the volunteers. Many expressed relief at finally receiving treatment for painful conditions that they had been enduring. We also had the opportunity to be the hands and feet, sharing Christ's love and praying with many of the patients throughout the day.

Thank you to the On Mission Team for supporting this Ministry, to Michael Thames for coordinating, to our church family for their support and for all the volunteers from our community and beyond. We could not have done it without you.
